Family Engagement and Leadership in Systems of Care Forecasted Grant Opportunity

DUE: January 3, 2023 (FORECAST ONLY, details to follow)

Eligibility: Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments) Maximum Funding: \$900,000

The Enhancing Family Engagement and Leadership program's purpose is to improve maternal and child health (MCH) outcomes by enhancing the engagement of individuals with lived experience and families in the systems that serve them through national leadership, identification of best practices to engage diverse families and youth, technical support to programs, including family to family health information centers, and promotion of shared definitions and metrics for family engagement across MCH.

USDA-FS-2022-CWDG-TRIBES APPLICATIONS COMING SOON! Community Wildfire Defense Grant 2022 Tribes

DUE: October 7, 2022

The purpose of the Community Wildfire Defense Grant is to assist at-risk local communities and Indian Tribes with planning and mitigating against the risk created by wildfire.

The Act prioritizes at-risk communities in an area identified as having high or very high wildfire hazard potential, are low-income, and/or have been impacted by a severe disaster. More details on these three priorities can be found in the Notices of Funding Opportunity (NOFOs).

The CWDG helps communities in the wildland urban interface (WUI) implement the three goals of the National Cohesive Wildland Fire Management Strategy (Cohesive Strategy):

Restore and Maintain Landscapes: Landscapes across all jurisdictions are resilient to fire-related disturbances, in accordance with management objectives.

Create Fire Adapted Communities: Human populations and infrastructure can withstand a wildfire without loss of life and property.

Improve Wildfire Response: All jurisdictions participate in making and implementing safe, effective, efficient risk-based wildfire management decisions.

This program is authorized in Public Law 117-58, Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, commonly referred to as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL).

There are two primary project types for which the grant provides funding:

The development and revision of Community Wildfire Protection Plans (CWPP)

The implementation of projects described in a CWPP that is less than ten years old

Eligible: Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized)

Public housing authorities/Indian housing authorities

City or township governments

Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments)

Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education

This program supports the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) Public Law 117-58, Sec. 40803 Wildfire Risk Reduction. The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) (STATE) Fuels Management and Community Fire Assistance programs use a risk-based approach that supports the National Cohesive Wildland Fire Management Strategy goals of restoring and maintaining Fire Resilient Landscapes, creating Fire Adapted Communities and Responding to Wildfire.



National Fish Passage Program Grant Opportunity, Department of the Interior Fish and Wildlife Service

DUE: December 30, 2022

Eligibility: Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized), Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments)

Maximum Funding: \$2,000,000

The program aims to maintain or increase fish populations in order to improve ecosystem resiliency and to provide quality fishing experiences for the American people. Activities that restore fish passage also support the modernization of the country's infrastructure such as road culverts, bridges, and water diversions.

Department of Housing and Urban Development

Indian Housing Block Grant

Due: November 17, 2022; 7:59pm Alaska Time

Under the program, eligible Indian tribes and tribally designated housing entities (TDHEs) receive grants to carry out a range of affordable housing activities. Grant funds may be used to develop, maintain, and operate affordable housing in safe and healthy environments on Indian reservations and in other Indian areas and carry out other affordable housing activities. Grant funds must be used to primarily benefit low-income Indian families.

Tribal Transportation Safety Funding Opportunity

DUE: September 15, 2022

Eligibility: Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized)

Maximum funding: Total program funding: \$22,000,000 - total program funding

The goal of TTPSF is to reduce deaths or serious injuries in transportation-related crashes in Tribal areas. The FHWA will prioritize projects that incorporate safety into existing infrastructure. Strategic safety planning, data collection and analysis, and the implementation of safety projects are objectives that contribute to achievement of the TTPSF goal. Transportation-related crashes in Tribal areas. The FHWA will prioritize projects that incorporate Tribal Transportation Safety Funding Opportunity

Historic Preservation Fund Grant Opportunity

DUE: September 14, 2022

Eligibility: Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized)

Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments)

Maximum Funding: \$750,000

The National Park Service's (NPS) History of Equal Rights Grant Program (HER) will preserve sites related to the struggle of all American's to achieve equal rights. HER grants are funded by the Historic Preservation Fund (HPF), administered by the NPS, and will fund a broad range of preservation projects for historic sites including: architectural services, historic structure reports, preservation plans, and physical preservation to structures. Grants are awarded through a competitive process and do not require non-Federal match.

National Archives and Records Administration Grant Opportunity

DUE: October 6, 2022

Eligibility: U.S. nonprofit organizations with 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status, Federally recognized Native American tribal governments

Maximum Funding: \$150,000

The NHPRC seeks archival projects that will significantly improve online public discovery and use of historical records collections. We welcome projects that engage the public, expand civic education, and promote understanding of the nation's history, democracy, and culture from the founding era to the present day.

Public Engagement with Historical Records, National Archives and Records Administration Grant Opportunity

DUE: October 6, 2022

Eligibility: U.S. nonprofit organizations with 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status

Federally recognized Native American tribal governments

Maximum Funding: \$150,000

The National Historical Publications and Records Commission seeks projects that encourage public engagement with historical records. The NHPRC is looking for collaborative projects that create models and technologies that other institutions can freely adopt, including the development of new tools that enable people to engage online.

TECHNOLOGY

Middle Mile Grant Program

Due: Sep 30, 2022

Eligibility: State, political subdivision of a State, Tribal government, technology company, electric utility, utility cooperative, public utility district, telecommunications company, telecommunications cooperative, nonprofit foundation, nonprofit corporation, nonprofit institution, nonprofit association, regional planning council, Native entity, economic development authority, or any partnership of two (2) or more of these entities.

Maximum Funding: \$5M to \$100M



The Middle Mile Broadband Infrastructure Grant (MMG) Program provides funding for the construction, improvement, or acquisition of middle mile infrastructure. The purpose of the grant program is to expand and extend middle mile infrastructure to reduce the cost of connecting areas that are unserved or underserved to the internet backbone.

FUNDER UPDATES

HOMEOWNER ASSISTANCE FUND HAF Plan Submission Process

Tribal governments and Tribally Designated Housing Entities (TDHE) participating in the [Homeowner Assistance Fund \(HAF\) program](#) must submit a HAF plan in order to receive the remainder of their allocation. Treasury encourages Tribes to submit their HAF plans as soon as possible. HAF plans must be submitted through the [online portal](#). Once in the portal, click on the "Submissions" button on the left-side menu where you'll find a prompt to submit your HAF plan.

CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND Closeout Procedures

If your Tribe has expended all Coronavirus Relief Funds (CRF), you must follow Treasury OIG's closeout procedures in your final quarterly report. Once your Tribe has entered and validated data for the final report, the authorizing official must check the box signing the financial progress report is ready for closeout and no adjustments or recoding on CRF will occur in the future.
