FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

HEALTH & BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

Family Engagement and Leadership in Systems of Care Forecasted Grant Opportunity

DUE: January 3, 2023 (FORECAST ONLY, details to follow)

Eligibility: Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments) Maximum Funding: \$900,000

The Enhancing Family Engagement and Leadership program's purpose is to improve maternal and child health (MCH) outcomes by enhancing the engagement of individuals with lived experience and families in the systems that serve them through national leadership, identification of best practices to engage diverse families and youth, technical support to programs, including family to family health information centers, and promotion of shared definitions and metrics for family engagement across MCH.

Rural Communities Opioid Response Program-Rural Tribal Support Forecast 1

Department of Health and Human Services/Health Resources and Services Administration

The purpose of this program is to expand access and improve quality of behavioral health care services across the care continuum for rural American Indian/Alaska Native populations.

Rural Communities Opioid Response Program-Overdose Response Forecast 1

Health Resources and Services Administration (<https://www.grants.gov/web/grants/view-opportunity.html?oppld=342804>)

The purpose of this program is to support immediate responses to the overdose crisis in rural areas through improving access to, capacity for, and sustainability of prevention, treatment, and recovery services for substance use disorder.



National Fish Passage Program Grant Opportunity, Department of the Interior Fish and Wildlife Service

DUE: December 30, 2022

Eligibility: Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized), Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments)

Maximum Funding: \$2,000,000

The program aims to maintain or increase fish populations in order to improve ecosystem resiliency and to provide quality fishing experiences for the American people. Activities that restore fish passage also support the modernization of the country's infrastructure such as road culverts, bridges, and water diversions.

Fiscal Year 2022 National Culvert Removal, Replacement, and Restoration Grant Program (Culvert AOP Program)

DUE: February 06, 2022

Eligibility: State, local, and tribal government entities are eligible to apply

Maximum Funding: \$20,000,000

The program provides competitive grants for the replacement, removal, and repair of culverts or weirs that: (1) would meaningfully improve or restore fish passage for anadromous fish; and (2) with respect to weirs, may include (A) infrastructure to facilitate anadromous fish passage around or over the weir; and (B) weir improvements (49U.S.C. § 6703(b)).

US Dept of Energy: MARINE ENERGY SYSTEMS INNOVATION AT SEA

DUE: Concept Paper - Nov 4, 2022; Full application - Feb.24, 2023

Eligibility: State, local, and tribal government entities are eligible to apply

Maximum Funding: \$2,125,000

The research and development (R&D) activities to be funded under this FOA will support the government-wide approach to the climate crisis by driving the innovation that can lead to the deployment of clean energy technologies, which are critical for climate protection. Specifically, this FOA will accelerate the development and testing of renewable marine energy technologies at sea by focusing on wave and ocean current resources as well as reductions in the energy use and carbon emissions associated with desalination.

This FOA supports marine energy research and additional test capabilities in three Topic Areas: (1) Marine Energy Powered Desalination System Innovation at Sea; (2) Marine Energy Powered Desalination Open Topic; and (3) Ocean Current Test Facility Feasibility Assessment.

IJA Bureau of Land Management (Alaska) Fuels Management and Community Fire Assistance

Department of the Interior/Bureau of Land Management

DUE: March 31, 2023

Eligible: Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized); Public housing authorities/Indian housing authorities; Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments); Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education

This program supports the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) Public Law 117-58, Sec. 40803 Wildfire Risk Reduction. The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) (STATE) Fuels Management and Community Fire Assistance programs use a risk-based approach that supports the National Cohesive Wildland Fire Management Strategy goals of restoring and maintaining Fire Resilient Landscapes, creating Fire Adapted Communities and Responding to Wildfire.



COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE

Community Development Block Grant Program for Indian Tribes and Alaska Native Villages

Department of Housing and Urban Development

Due: Oct 24, 2022

The primary objective of the Indian Community Development Block Grant (ICDBG) program is the development of viable Indian and Alaska Native communities, including the creation of decent housing, suitable living environments, and economic opportunities primarily for persons of low- and moderate-incomes. See the ICDBG regulations at 24 CFR 1003.2, full text of which is available at 24 CFR part 1003.

- a. Single Purpose Grants. Projects funded by the ICDBG program must principally benefit low- and moderate-income persons (24 CFR 1003.208). These are competitive grants and are the subject of this NOFO.
- b. Imminent Threat Grants. Projects funded with Imminent Threat grant funds are to address issues that have an immediate negative impact on public health or safety of tribal residents. You do not have to apply for an Imminent Threat grant by the deadline established in this NOFO. These funds are awarded on a first-come first-serve basis until the amount set aside for this purpose is expended.

Department of the Interior, Bureau of Indian Affairs

DUE: October 24, 2022, at 5 pm Eastern Time

The Office of the Assistant Secretary – Indian Affairs, through OIED, is soliciting proposals from federally recognized Tribes listed as Indian Entities Recognized by and Eligible to Receive Services from the United States Bureau of Indian Affairs at 87 FR 4636 (January 28, 2022) and Tribal Organizations eligible for TTGP grants. Indian Tribes are referred to using the term “Tribe” throughout this notice. Tribal Organization is defined by 25 U.S.C. 5304(l).

The grant funding is to retain consultants to perform feasibility studies on Tribal tourism opportunities or develop a tourism business plan. The feasibility studies will help facilitate informed decision-making regarding Tribes’ economic futures and may concern the viability of a tourism project. The feasibility study or business plan will empower Tribes to make informed decisions on potential tourism project(s), a Tribal tourism business, or Tribal tourism businesses recovering from the economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. The OIED supports Tribes and Tribal organizations capacity building to plan, develop and manage tourism and related infrastructure in support of economic development and the NATIVE Act (Pub. L. 114-221).

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)

State of Alaska, DCCED, Division of Community and Regional Affairs

Due December 2, 2022

The goals of the program are to:

- ensure that the state’s CDBG funds will be used to principally benefit low- and moderate-income persons,
- provide financial resources to communities for public facilities, planning, and special economic development activities that encourage community self-sufficiency, reduce the costs of essential community services, and reduce or eliminate conditions that are detrimental to the health and safety of residents, and
- assist in the creation or retention of jobs that primarily benefit low- and moderate-income persons.

The State of Alaska has chosen to consider only those projects which meet the first national objective. Your project must meet the first objective to be considered for State of Alaska CDBG funding.

- Principally benefit persons of low and moderate income

FY 2022 Choice Neighborhoods Implementation Grant Program

Department of Housing and Urban Development

DUE: January 11, 2023

Eligibility: Public housing authorities/Indian housing authorities; The Lead Applicant can be either a Public Housing Agency (PHA), local government, or tribal entity. A Co-Applicant can be a local government, PHA, tribal entity, or the owner of the target HUD-assisted housing (e.g., nonprofit or for-profit developer).

Award Ceiling: \$50,000,000

Choice Neighborhoods Implementation Grants support the implementation of comprehensive neighborhood revitalization plans that are expected to achieve the following three core goals: 1. Housing: Replace distressed public and assisted housing with high-quality mixed-income housing that is well-managed and responsive to the needs of the surrounding neighborhood; 2. People: Improve outcomes of households living in the target housing related to employment and income, health, and children’s education; and 3. Neighborhood: Create the conditions necessary for public and private reinvestment in distressed neighborhoods to offer the kinds of amenities and assets, including safety, good schools, and commercial activity, that are important to families’ choices about their community.

2023 Tribal Transportation Program Safety Fund

Department of Transportation/DOT Federal Highway Administration

DUE: January 15, 2023

Eligibility: Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized)

Award Ceiling: \$21,238,560

Eligible projects described in section 148(a)(4) are strategies, activities, and projects on a public road that are consistent with a transportation safety plan and that (i) correct or improve a hazardous road location or feature, or (ii) address a highway safety problem. TTPSF emphasizes the development of strategic transportation safety plans using a data-driven process as a means for Tribes to identify transportation safety needs and determine how those needs will be addressed in Tribal communities. FHWA has identified four eligibility categories: transportation safety plans; data assessment, improvement, and analysis activities; systemic roadway departure countermeasures; and infrastructure improvements and other eligible activities as listed in 23 U.S.C. § 148(a)(4).

Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) Department of Homeland Security - FEMA

Due: Jan 27, 2023

Estimated Total Program Funding: \$2,200,000,000

The program makes federal funds available for pre-disaster mitigation activities. The guiding principles of the program are to: (1) support state and local governments, tribes, and territories through capability- and capacity-building to enable them to identify mitigation actions and implement projects that reduce risks posed by natural hazards; (2) encourage and enable innovation while allowing flexibility, consistency, and effectiveness; (3) promote partnerships and enable high-impact investments to reduce risk from natural hazards with a focus on critical services and facilities, public infrastructure, public safety, public health, and communities; (4) provide an opportunity to reduce future losses and minimize impacts on the Disaster Relief Fund; (5) promote equity, including by helping members of overburdened and under-served groups; and, (6) support the adoption and enforcement of building codes, standards, and policies that will protect the health, safety, and general welfare of the public, taking into account future conditions, prominently including the effects of climate change, and have long-lasting impacts on community risk reduction, including for critical services and facilities and for future disaster costs.

Department of Homeland Security- FEMA Fiscal Year 2022 Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA)

Due: Jan 27, 2023

The Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA) grant program makes federal funds available to states, U.S. territories, federally recognized tribal governments, and local governments to reduce or eliminate the risk of repetitive flood damage to buildings and structures insured under the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). It does so with a recognition of the growing flood hazards associated with climate change, and of the need for flood hazard risk mitigation activities that promote climate adaptation, equity, and resilience with respect to flooding. These include both acute extreme weather events and chronic stress factors which have been observed and are expected to increase in intensity and frequency in the future.

Fiscal Year 2022 National Culvert Removal, Replacement, and Restoration Grant Program (Culvert AOP Program)

Department of Transportation/DOT Federal Highway Administration

Due: February 6, 2023

The primary goal of the Culvert AOP Program is to improve or restore anadromous fish passage through the replacement, removal, repair, or improvement of culverts or weirs. The grant program prioritizes projects that would improve fish passage for: (A) anadromous fish stocks listed as an endangered species or a threatened species under section 4 of the Endangered Species Act of 1973 (16 U.S.C. § 1533); (B) anadromous fish stocks identified by the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) or the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) that could reasonably become listed as an endangered species or a threatened species under that section; (C) anadromous fish stocks identified by the NMFS or the USFWS as prey for endangered species, threatened species, or protected species, including Southern resident orcas (*Orcinus orca*); or (D) anadromous fish stocks identified by the NMFS or the USFWS as climate resilient stocks (49 U.S.C. § 6703(e)(1)). The program also prioritizes projects that would open up more than 200 meters of upstream (anadromous) habitat before the end of the natural habitat (49 U.S.C. § 6703(e)(2)).

LANGUAGE, CULTURE, & PRESERVATION

Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian Culture and Arts Development Grant Program

Department of the Interior National Park Service

DUE: Oct 31, 2022, at 11:59 pm Pacific Time

Eligibility: Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized); Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments); Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education

This funding is for the purpose of supporting programs for Native Hawaiian or Alaska Native culture and arts development to any private, nonprofit organization or institution which—

- (1) primarily serves and represents Native Hawaiians or Alaska Natives, and
- (2) has been recognized by the Governor of the State of Hawaii or the Governor of the State of Alaska, as appropriate, for the purpose of making such organization or institution eligible to receive such grants.

Grants will enhance culture and art programs, including traditional and contemporary expressions of language, history, visual and performing arts, and crafts.

Programs may

- (1) provide scholarly study of, and instruction in, Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian traditional and contemporary arts and culture,
- (2) establish centers and educational programs that lead to degrees in Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian art and culture programs, and/or
- (3) establish programs that develop traditional and contemporary arts in the community through coordinate efforts to preserve, support, revitalize, and develop evolving forms of Indian art and culture (as defined in 20 U.S.C. § 4402(1)).

Examples include: a Departments of Arts and Sciences, fellowship programs, seminars, scholar in residence, inter-institutional programs of cooperation at national and international levels, visual arts, performance arts, language, literature, museology, and learning resource centers. This is a new program in Fiscal Year 2022.

Department of Labor/Employment and Training Administration

DUE: January 10, 2023 (FORECAST ONLY, details to follow)

Eligibility: Nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education
Independent school districts; Private institutions of higher education; City or township governments; Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments); Public housing authorities/Indian housing authorities; County governments; Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; State governments; Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized)

Award Ceiling: \$1,500,000

Award Floor: \$700,000

FUNDER UPDATES

HOMEOWNER ASSISTANCE FUND HAF Plan Submission Process

Tribal governments and Tribally Designated Housing Entities (TDHE) participating in the Homeowner Assistance Fund (HAF) program must submit a HAF plan in order to receive the remainder of their allocation. Treasury encourages Tribes to submit their HAF plans as soon as possible. HAF plans must be submitted through the on-line portal. Once in the portal, click on the "Submissions" button on the left-side menu where you'll find a prompt to submit your HAF plan.
