Funding for Firewood Banks

Due: Applications will be processed on a rolling basis until the end of summer in 2023 or until they run out.
Alliance for Green Heat

Eligible firewood banks can apply by filling out the online application at this site: <https://www.firewoodbanks.org/copy-of-overview>. Almost any items needed to run your firewood bank is an eligible expense except for food & drink, entertainment, lobbying, and items over \$5,000. Eligible expenses include chain saws, splitters, tarps, moisture meters, conveyor belts, trailers, wheelbarrows, safety equipment, first aid kits, equipment repair, building materials for firewood sheds or tool sheds, educational materials/activities, sales tax, signage, travel, gas money, and miscellaneous supplies like small tools that cost less than \$20. Firewood banks are invited to add other additional items not listed here that they use or think may be helpful.

Bureau of Indian Affairs – Invasive Species (IS)

Due: Close of business on January 13, 2023.

Eligibility is limited to Federally recognized Indian Tribal Governments and Native American Organizations authorized by Indian tribal governments.

Successful applications will focus on the management/control of invasive species on tribal trust lands, individual Indian allotment lands, or in areas managed by tribes through treaties or agreements. Instead of focusing on the definition of “Invasive Species,” this program will focus on the damage caused to Tribal Trust Resources and leave it to the discretion of the applicant to describe whether the species is “invasive” or represents an instance in which a native species is behaving as an invasive species due to altered environmental conditions. This funding can cover all invasive species (plants/animals) outside of noxious weeds in agricultural settings. 1) Planning; 2) Prevention; 3) Implementation funding would assist tribes in implementing management plans or other established protocols aimed at the control, management, or prevention of IS. Funding requests can range from \$2,500 - \$250,000 per application.

Fiscal Year 2022 National Culvert Removal, Replacement, and Restoration Grant Program (Culvert AOP Program)

Due: February 06, 2023

Eligibility: State, local, and tribal government entities are eligible to apply

Maximum Funding: \$20,000,000

The program provides competitive grants for the replacement, removal, and repair of culverts or weirs that: (1) would meaningfully improve or restore fish passage for anadromous fish; and (2) with respect to weirs, may include (A) infrastructure to facilitate anadromous fish passage around or over the weir; and (B) weir improvements (49U.S.C. § 6703(b)).

U.S. Department of Energy: Marine Energy Systems Innovations At Sea

DUE: Concept Paper - Nov 4, 2022; Full application - Feb.24, 2023

Eligibility: State, local, and tribal government entities are eligible to apply

Maximum Funding: \$2,125,000

The research and development (R&D) activities to be funded under this FOA will support the government-wide approach to the climate crisis by driving the innovation that can lead to the deployment of clean energy technologies, which are critical for climate protection. Specifically, this FOA will accelerate the development and testing of renewable marine energy technologies at sea by focusing on wave and ocean current resources as well as reductions in the energy use and carbon emissions associated with desalination. This FOA supports marine energy research and additional test capabilities in three Topic Areas: (1) Marine Energy Powered Desalination System Innovation at Sea; (2) Marine Energy Powered Desalination Open Topic; and (3) Ocean Current Test Facility Feasibility Assessment.



2023 Tribal Transportation Program Safety Fund

Department of Transportation/DOT Federal Highway Administration

DUE: January 15, 2023

Eligibility: Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized)

Award Ceiling: \$21,238,560

Eligible projects described in section 148(a)(4) are strategies, activities, and projects on a public road that are consistent with a transportation safety plan and that (i) correct or improve a hazardous road location or feature, or (ii) address a highway safety problem. TTPSF emphasizes the development of strategic transportation safety plans using a data-driven process as a means for Tribes to identify transportation safety needs and determine how those needs will be addressed in Tribal communities. FHWA has identified four eligibility categories: transportation safety plans; data assessment, improvement, and analysis activities; systemic roadway departure countermeasures; and infrastructure improvements and other eligible activities as listed in 23 U.S.C. § 148(a)(4).

Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC)

Department of Homeland Security - FEMA

Due: Jan 27, 2023, 3 p.m. ET

Estimated Total Program Funding: \$2,200,000,000

FEMA's BRIC grant program give states, local communities, tribes and territories funding to address future risks to natural disasters, including ones involving: wildfires, drought, hurricanes, earthquakes, extreme heat, and flooding. Addressing these risks helps make communities more resilient.

Direct Technical Assistance: In addition to providing funding, the BRIC program offers help to communities in the form of non-financial Direct Technical Assistance that can provide holistic hazard mitigation planning and project support. The program makes federal funds available for pre-disaster mitigation activities. The guiding principles of the program are to: (1) support state and local governments, tribes, and territories through capability- and capacity-building to enable them to identify mitigation actions and implement projects that reduce risks posed by natural hazards; (2) encourage and enable innovation while allowing flexibility, consistency, and effectiveness; (3) promote partnerships and enable high-impact investments to reduce risk from natural hazards with a focus on critical services and facilities, public infrastructure, public safety, public health, and communities; (4) provide an opportunity to reduce future losses and minimize impacts on the Disaster Relief Fund; (5) promote equity, including by helping members of overburdened and under-served groups; and, (6) support the adoption and enforcement of building codes, standards, and policies that will protect the health, safety, and general welfare of the public, taking into account future conditions.

Department of Homeland Security- FEMA

FY 2022 Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA)

Due: Jan 27, 2023

The Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA) grant program makes federal funds available to states, U.S. territories, federally recognized tribal governments, and local governments to reduce or eliminate the risk of repetitive flood damage to buildings and structures insured under the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). It does so with a recognition of the growing flood hazards associated with climate change, and of the need for flood hazard risk mitigation activities that promote climate adaptation, equity, and resilience with respect to flooding. These include both acute extreme weather events and chronic stressfactors which have been observed and are expected to increase in intensity and frequency in the future.

Fiscal Year 2022 National Culvert Removal, Replacement, and Restoration Grant Program (Culvert AOP Program)

Department of Transportation/DOT Federal Highway Administration

Due: February 6, 2023

The primary goal of the Culvert AOP Program is to improve or restore anadromous fish passage through the replacement, removal, repair, or improvement of culverts or weirs. The grant program prioritizes projects that would improve fish passage for: (A) anadromous fish stocks listed as an endangered species or a threatened species under section 4 of the Endangered Species Act of 1973 (16 U.S.C. § 1533); (B) anadromous fish stocks identified by the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) or the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) that could reasonably become listed as an endangered species or a threatened species under that section; (C) anadromous fish stocks identified by the NMFS or the USFWS as prey for endangered species, threatened species, or protected species, including Southern resident orcas (*Orcinus orca*); or (D) anadromous fish stocks identified by the NMFS or the USFWS as climate resilient stocks (49 U.S.C. § 6703(e)(1)). The program also prioritizes projects that would open up more than 200 meters of upstream (anadromous) habitat before the end of the natural habitat (49 U.S.C. § 6703(e)(2)).

LANGUAGE, CULTURE, & PRESERVATION

Bureau of Indian Affairs Tribal Youth Initiative (TYI) Program

DUE: January 13, 2023

Funding requests can range from \$2,000 to \$50,000 per application.

Eligibility is limited to Federally Recognized Indian Tribal Governments and Native American Organizations authorized by Indian tribal governments. Initiative funding for the support and development of tribal youth programs focused on science in alignment with conservation and resource management will be distributed on a competitive basis to tribes and inter-tribal organizations. The programs will provide opportunities for youth to engage in the field of natural resource management and encourage their interest in pursuing educational opportunities and careers in natural resources management.

Tribal Heritage Grants FY2022 Historic Preservation Fund

DUE: March 29, 2023

Funding Maximum is \$75,000

This funding focuses on what they are most concerned about protecting: Traditional skills, oral history, plant and animal species important in tradition, sacred and historic places, and the establishment of tribal historic preservation offices.

Eligibility is Federally recognized Tribes • Alaska Native Villages/Corporations • Native Hawaiian Organizations This funding opportunity is limited to Indian Tribes that meet the definition in 54 USC 300309.

Funding can be used for: 1. Locating and identifying cultural resources a. Survey and inventory of historic or significant places b. Survey of traditional skills and information 2. Preserving a historic property listed in the national register of historic places a. Project planning (plans and specifications for preserving a structure or site) b. Repair work to preserve a specific historic structure or site 3. Comprehensive preservation planning 4. Oral history and documenting cultural traditions 5. Training and education for building a Historic Preservation Program 6. Cultural and historic preservation interpretation and education

TECHNOLOGY

YouthBuild

Department of Labor/Employment and Training Administration

DUE: January 10, 2023

Eligibility: Nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education Independent school districts; Private institutions of higher education; City or township governments; Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments); Public housing authorities/Indian housing authorities; County governments; Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; State governments; Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized)

Award Ceiling: \$1,500,000

Award Floor: \$700,000
