FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

HEALTH

Mental Health Awareness Training Grants Department of Health and Human Services

Due: May 1

Up to \$200,000; No match required

Eligible: Indian tribes, or tribal organizations (as such terms are defined in section 5304 of title 25), and non-profit private entities.

The purpose of this program is to: (1) train individuals (e.g., school personnel and emergency services personnel including fire department and law enforcement personnel, veterans, armed services members and their families, etc.) to recognize the signs and symptoms of mental disorders and how to safely de-escalate crisis situations involving individuals with a mental illness and (2) provide education on resources available in the community for individuals with a mental illness and other relevant resources, including how to establish linkages with school and/or community-based mental health agencies. With this program, SAMHSA aims to increase the number of individuals prepared and trained on how to respond to individuals with mental disorders appropriately and safely. In accordance with Executive Order 14074, this program will help build secure, safe, and healthy communities; reinforce partnership between law enforcement and communities; and increase public trust and enhance public safety.

OVW Fiscal Year 2023 Tribal Sexual Assault Services Program

Department of Justice

Deadline: May 1, 2023

\$500,000-\$525,000; no match required

Eligible: Native American tribal governments (both federally recognized and other than federally recognized). Also: tribal consortiums, tribal organizations and nonprofit tribal organizations.

The Tribal Sexual Assault Services Program supports efforts to create, maintain, and expand sustainable sexual assault services provided by Tribes, tribal organizations, and nonprofit tribal organizations within Indian country and Alaska Native villages. TSASP supported projects provide intervention, advocacy, accompaniment (e.g., accompanying victims to court, medical facilities, or police departments), support services, and related assistance for adult, youth, and child victims of sexual assault, non-offending family and household members of victims, and those collaterally affected by the sexual assault. BJA FY 23 Preventing School Violence: BJA's STOP School Violence Program

Office of Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention

Deadline: May 8, 2023

Awards: Up to \$2,000,000; no match required

Eligible: Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized), non-profits, independent school districts

This solicitation aims to increase school safety through the development and expansion of violence prevention and reduction programs and strategies (K-12th grade). The goals of the program are to (1) reduce the incidence of school violence through improved school safety and climate and (2) prevent youth violence, delinquency, and victimization in the targeted community.

OJJDP expects applicants to utilize a collaborative approach between schools and community-based organizations (CBOs) to develop and implement these strategies. (NOTE: Funds may not be used for equipment to secure schools, such as cameras, security systems, fencing, locks, etc. In addition, these funds may not be used to pay for armed security officers or school resource officers.)

Cooperative Agreements for School-Based Trauma-Informed Support Services and Mental Health Care for Children and Youth

Department of Health and Human Services

Deadline: May 8, 2023

Up to \$970,000; no match required

The purpose of this program is to increase student access to evidence-based and culturally relevant trauma support services and mental health care by developing innovative initiatives, activities, and programs to link local school systems with local trauma-informed support and mental health systems, including those under the Indian Health Service. With this program, SAMHSA aims to further enhance and improve trauma-informed support and mental health services for children and youth.

Tribal Behavioral Health

Department of Health and Human Services

Deadline: May 15, 2023

Awards up to \$250,000; no match required

Eligible: Federally recognized American Indian/Alaska Native (AI/AN) tribes, tribal organizations, Urban Indian Organizations, or consortia of tribes or tribal organizations.

The purpose of this program is to prevent and reduce suicidal behavior and substance use/misuse, reduce the impact of trauma, and promote mental health among American Indian/Alaska Native (AI/AN) youth, up to and including age 24, by building a healthy network of systems, services, and partnerships that impact youth. SAMHSA expects this program will be a model for community change that integrates a community's culture, resources, and readiness to address suicide prevention and substance use/misuse among AI/AN youth. This NOFO will remain open for three fiscal years. Applicants that do not receive funding are eligible to apply for the following fiscal year.

NATURAL RESOURCES

Funding for Firewood Banks

Alliance for Green Heat

Due: Applications will be processed on a rolling basis until the end of summer in 2023 or until they run out. Eligible firewood banks can apply by filling out the online application at this site: www.firewoodbanks.org/copy-of-overview. Almost any items needed to run your firewood bank is an eligible expense except for food & drink, entertainment, lobbying, and items over \$5,000. Eligible expenses include chain saws, splitters, tarps, moisture meters, conveyor belts, trailers, wheelbarrows, safety equipment, first aid kits, equipment repair, building materials for firewood sheds or tool sheds, educational materials/activities, sales tax, signage, travel, gas money, and miscellaneous supplies like small tools that cost less than \$20. Firewood banks are invited to add other additional items not listed here that they use or think may be helpful.

Composting and Food Waste Reduction (CFWR) Pilot Project

Department of Agriculture

Deadline: June 15

Awards: \$55,000-\$400,000; 25% match required

Eligibility: Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized)

This program provides financial assistance to municipalities, school districts, counties, local governments, special district governments, tribal governments (State-designated Indian Tribes, Federally Recognized Indian Tribal Governments), or tribal organizations to carry out food waste reduction and composting objectives.

Bipartisan Infrastructure Law: Energy Improvement in Rural or Remote Area

Department of Energy

Due: June 28

Funding: \$5M-\$100M; no match required

Eligibility: Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized and not federally recognized), non-profits

DOE's Energy Improvements in Rural or Remote Areas (ERA) Program will provide financial investment, technical assistance, and other resources to advance clean energy demonstrations and energy solutions that are replicable and scalable. ERA aims to fund clean energy projects with three specific goals: 1. Deliver measurable benefits to energy customers in rural or remote areas by funding replicable energy projects that lower energy costs, improve energy access and resilience, and/or reduce environmental harm; 2. Demonstrate new rural or remote energy system models using climate-resilient technologies, business structures that promote economic resilience, new financing mechanisms, and/or new community engagement best practices; and 3. Build clean energy knowledge, capacity, and self-reliance in rural America.

COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE

National Endowment for the Humanities Cultural and Community Resilience

Due: May 16, 2023

Grant Amount: \$150,000; no match required

Eligibility: Federally recognized tribes

The National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) Division of Preservation and Access is accepting applications for the Cultural and Community Resilience program. This program supports community-based efforts to mitigate climate change and COVID-19 pandemic impacts, safeguard cultural resources, and foster cultural resilience through identifying, documenting, and/or collecting cultural heritage and community experience. The program prioritizes projects from disadvantaged communities in the United States or its jurisdictions, and the NEH encourages applications that employ inclusive methodologies.

LANGUAGE, CULTURE, & PRESERVATION

Historic Preservation Fund- Annual Tribal Historic Preservation Office Grants

National Park Service

Due: May 1, 2023

\$20,000-\$200,000; No match required

This funding program supports the operation of Tribal Historic Preservation Offices. The purpose of this program is to provide grants to THPOs for the identification, evaluation, and protection of historic properties by such means as: survey, planning, technical assistance, development, education, listings in the National Register of Historic Places, review and compliance, and to assist THPOs in carrying out the historic preservation activities that the Tribe agreed to assume from the State Historic Preservation Office, on tribal lands, under their Partnership agreement with the National Park Service.

Digital Projects for the Public

National Endowment for the Humanities

Deadline June 14, 2023

Awards: Up to \$400,000; no match required

Eligible: Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized), non-profits

The Digital Projects for the Public program supports projects that interpret and analyze humanities content in primarily digital platforms and formats, such as websites, mobile applications and tours, interactive touch screens and kiosks, games, and virtual environments. \$100,000 (Prototyping grants); \$400,000 (Production grants); Maximum award amount \$30,000 (Discovery grants).

OTHER

Tribal Court Improvement Program

Department of Health and Human Services

Deadline: June 15, 2023

Awards: \$50,000-\$150,000; no match required

Eligible: Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments) Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized)

The Administration for Children and Families, Children's Bureau announces the availability of awards to provide tribes and tribal consortia the opportunity to compete for grants to enable tribal courts to design and implement projects and/or activities to assess, expand, or enhance the effectiveness of tribal courts and/or legal representation in cases related to child welfare, family preservation, family reunification, guardianship, and adoption. In doing this work, grantees are required to engage in and demonstrate "meaningful, ongoing collaboration" with the tribal social service agencies.
